Austria – Czechia: Common Declaration on Recommendations for the Mutual Recognition of Qualifications in Higher Education

QUOTATION

Common Declaration between the Federal Minister for Science and Research of the Republic of Austria and the Minister for School Education, Youth and Sport of the Czech Republic on Recommendations for the Mutual Recognition of Qualifications in Higher Education

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TEXT

The Federal Minister of Science and Research of the Republic of Austria and the Minister of School Education, Youth and Sport of the Czech Republic have agreed to recommend to the authorities responsible for the recognition of qualifications in higher education of the both countries the following:

- On the basis of the Convention on the Recognition of Qualifications concerning
 Higher Education in the European Region of 11 April 1997, signed at Lisbon (Lisbon Recognition Convention) and
- With regard to the preparation of the Agreement between the Government of the Republic of Austria and the Government of the Czech Republic on the Cooperation in the Fields of Culture, School, Science, Youth and Sport

Commonly hit the ascertainments contained in the subsequent articles 1 to 5 and 9 and agree to submit to the authorities responsible for the recognition of qualifications in higher education the recommendations contained in the subsequent articles 6 to 8:

Article 1. Terms

The terms of Article I of the Lisbon Recognition Convention correspond to the following terms in the both countries, liste in the subsequent chart:

Article 2. Competence

(1) In the Republic of Austria:

a) In principle, the organs of <u>higher education institutions</u> decide on questions of academic recognition, including the admission to studies and the recognition of examinations.

b) In some particular cases due to bilateral agreements the <u>Federal Minister of Science</u> <u>and Research</u> is competent for decisions.

(2) In the Czech Republic:

a) Decisions on academic recognition of foreign higher education programmes or parts of them are in principle by a <u>public higher education institution</u> which offers a corresponding higher education programme, unless an international agreement to which the Czech Republic is bound does not provide in another way. b) The <u>Ministry for School Education, Youth and Sport</u> decides on the recognition of foreign higher education programmes or parts of them either if they have been pased in a country in which the foreign higher education institution has been established and recognized and with which an international agreement on the recognition of the equivalence of educational documents has been concluded and which entrusts the Ministry with the recognition, or possibly if there are doubts on which public higher education institution a subject-corresponding higher education programm is offered and which ofthem therefore is competent for the decision.

c) In the field of military service decisions on academic recognition of foreign higher education programmes or parts of them are taken by the <u>Ministry for Defense</u>, in the field of securtiy service by the <u>Ministry for Internal Affairs</u>.

Article 3. Higher education institutions

The following institutions form part of higher education:

(1) In the Republic of Austria:

universities universities of applied sciences private higher education institutions university colleges of education

(2) In the Czech Republic:

puclic higher education institutions private higher education institutions state higher education institutions (military or police institutions)

Article 4. Higher education programmes

In both countries exists the trinary ("Bologna system") als well as the binary study system, both of them listed in the subsequent chart. The numbers in brackets indicate the duration of studies in years, prescribed by law. As for the Republic of Austria, these numbers contain the present stage as well as the changes envisaged.

Article 5. Admission requirements to higher education

(1) Admission requirements to higher education is in both countries in many cases dependant on the fulfilment of subject-specific requirements.

(2) The knowledge of the relevant language of teaching (German or Czech, respectively, in single cases also another language) shall be ascertained by the receiving higher education institution.

Article 6. Qualifications giving access to higher education

It is recommended that an Austrian secondary school leaving certificate (*Reifezeugnis*) and a Czech school leaving certificate (*Vysvědčení o maturitní zkoušce*) are mutually recognized as equivalent educational qualifications for the purpose of access to all kinds of higher education programmes without substantial differences.

Article 7. Recognition of examinations

It is recommended that the recognition of single examinations should take place on the basis of a case-by-case decision taken by the competent authority, due to the existing equivalence. Examinations which have been taken in a corresponding study programme shall be recognized for a relevant subject, university, provided that the number of ECTS credits is the same or only slightly different.

Article 8. Recognition of higher education qualifications

(1) It is recommended that academic degrees which have been awarded in the respective other country shall be recognized equivalent with regard to their placement in the higher education system, provided that the final diplomas correspond to each other as follows:

(2) In the Republic of Austria, also the Master degrees in further education (MAS, MBA, MA, MSc, ...) belong to the academic degrees of higher education institutions. They are, however, conferred not on the basis of degree programmes, but of university courses in further education. These degrees do not have a correspondence in the Czech Republic.

(3) All academic degrees, including the official abbreviations, may be used in the respective other country in the original version, even if there does not exist a correspondence in the educational system of this country.

(4) A habilitation completed in the Republic of Austria and a habilitation completed in the Czech Republic should be recognized as comparable qualifications for the prupose of self-guided fulfilment of tasks of research and teaching and the participation as examinators and supervisors in promotion and habilitation procedures.

Article 9. Information

(1) At the time of the signature of this Common Declaration, the following authorities of bith countries are encharged with the function of the National Information Centres according to Article IX.2 of the Lisbon Recognition Convention, and with the function of the membership in the European Network of National Information Centres on Academic Recognition and Mobility (ENIC Network) according to Article X.2 of this Convention:
